From band-aids to bloody noses, academy deans are often the first line healthcare provider when the school nurse is not on campus. This seminar will provide tips and tools for assessing and treating minor injuries or illnesses; best practice charting; and when to seek out emergency services. In dealing with a medical emergency, we will also discuss the importance of having a plan in place that includes communication and collaboration strategies.

→ New Trends in Common Drugs Usage-Signs and Symptoms

This presentation will cover the most commonly abused drugs that police deal with in Lincoln along with their signs and symptoms of use and abuse. Officer Genoways is a certified Drug Recognition Expert (DRE), a certified state DRE instructor and leads DRE program for Lincoln Police Department. DREs conduct drug influence evaluations on drivers who are suspected of being under the influence of drugs. They are not only trained to identify impairment but are also trained to identify what type of drug that a person has taken.

This session will conclude with a focus on John 1 (Jesus as the Word) and II Corinthians 2 (our lives as publications of the Gospel).
